The toddlers are also learning how to put on their jackets by themselves with a special trick; so, if you see your child putting his/her jacket on the floor and trying to put it on, he/she is just repeating what we are doing at school. Sensorial area: The new Montessori work of the week is the brown stairs that develops the child's visual discrimination of dimensions.

Practical life skills: In order to get ready for the Holidays the children are polishing a pumpkin with water and a tooth brush, and are also practicing to clean up the spills on the tray. Another work is slicing wooden fruit with a wooden knife

Art: The toddlers are strengthening their hands muscles with crayon rubbing and they are mastering the dot-a-dot work.

The potty training challenge! What to do if you have noticed any of the readiness signs:

- Ask your child to use the toilet every time you change his/her diaper.
- Say "It is time to go potty!" instead of "Would you like to go potty?"
- Take toys, books, sing a song together. It might take some minutes...
- Do not rush your child.
- If anything happens, it is OK. Try again after 20/30 minutes.
- Celebrate the success! Continue to encourage your child.
